The Maxine Goodman Levin College at Cleveland State University is one of the top ten urban affairs schools in the nation. U.S. News & World Report: "America's Best Graduate Schools" 2008 ranked it number two in the nation for its city management / urban policy graduate specialty.

The College offers 14 degree programs that equip students with the technical and management skills needed to launch careers in fields such as public management, planning, public safety, historic preservation, environmental studies, economic development and housing. Degree completion programs are available for community college transfer students with A.A., A.A.S., A.A.B. degrees in human services, health sciences, paralegal studies, police science, emergency management, or fire science.

Nonprofit Administration Major

The Nonprofit Administration Major is designed to:

- Promote the development of leadership skills necessary to create positive social change.
- Prepare students to engage and manage volunteers and professionals.
- Teach strategies for the analysis of complex issues affecting nonprofit organizations.

What is the career outlook for a degree in Nonprofit Administration??

Graduates of the Nonprofit Administration program are employed in children and family services agencies, in non-profit organizations, and in other agencies with a human services mission. A major in Nonprofit Administration is good preparation for law school, or for graduate study in Nonprofit Administration and Leadership, Public Administration, Social Work or Community Agency Counseling.

Career Services assistance is available at the college through job postings, government and post-graduate internship opportunities, and a mentoring program. The Cleveland State Career Services Office offers career counseling, interview preparation, and resume review on site. The required nonprofit administration internship gives students practical experience in settings designed to complement their degree program.

The Bachelor of Arts in Nonprofit Administration curriculum takes full advantage of its location in a major urban setting in fulfilling its commitment to urban education, research and community service.

The curriculum utilizes the resources of the Levin College and other related departments throughout the University for its interdisciplinary academic program. Students pursuing the

Nonprofit Administration majors take courses and seminars dealing directly with problems and issues in the field and their solutions. The major can be completed in the evening. The Nonprofit Administration major is also offered at Lorain County Community College's University Partnership. The Nonprofit Administration major is designed to facilitate transfer for students with A.A.S. degrees in Human Services or Social Work. A total number of 128 hours are required for the Bachelor of Arts in Nonprofit Administration. All degree seeking students are required to complete a specific number of General Education (GenEd) courses. Students are responsible for ensuring the appropriate selection of courses to satisfy GenEd requirements and are encouraged to consult with their academic advisor regarding the applicability of selected courses. NOTE: One of the two non-US courses in Arts & Humanities and Social Science (above) must be focused on Africa, Asia, Latin America, or the Middle East
