CLEVELAND: THE AFRICAN-AMERICAN EXPERIENCE PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE <u>UST 202 - Fall 2007</u>

Course Description

This introductory course will explore the past, present, and future of Cleveland using the African-American experience as the focus. The course will employ interdisciplinary perspectives, including history, demography, economics, political science and city planning. Students will examine the origins and dynamics of the city's growth and decline, placing special emphasis on current black economic, institutional and political issues. Since 55 percent of Cleveland's 2005 population is African-American, the reality of race and racial discrimination will be central to our discussions of housing, poverty, education and other functional issues. Extensive efforts will be made to link abstract theories with the reality of present-day Cleveland experience.

Guest lecturers will be invited, including several black leaders with long personal involvement in the city of Cleveland's affairs.

Course Objectives

This course should familiarize students with the historical, economic, and political evolution of the city of Cleveland and its current issues and problems especially as these problems relate to African-American citizens. It should also provide students with a basic understanding of black evolution in the city and Cleveland's major institutions and their place within the larger region and the state. The course complements: UST 200 (Introduction to Urban Studies); UST 419 (Neighborhood Analysis); and HIS 307 (History of Cleveland).

Assignments

Students will be asked to take a mid-term test and a final exam and write three short papers.

The first paper will be approximately three (3) typed and double-spaced pages in length. Using your assigned textbook \underline{A} Ghetto Takes Shape by Kenneth Kusmer, supplementary readings and class discussions, you are to describe the urban changes that look place from 1870 to 1930 that created Cleveland's Central Avenue ghetto. Touch on migration patterns, occupational and housing discrimination, racial discrimination and other issues. The first paper will be due Thursday, September 27th. (10 points).

The second paper will be a report on the census tract which has been assigned to you. Using the census books at NODIS and

data from the Housing Research Project you are to display the following data for each decade from 1980 to 2000: population; race (white, black, other); percent owners; percent renters; average size of household and median sales price. You are to analyze these data and write a short (3-5 page) paper on what happened in your census tract from 1980 to 2000. Recent photos will strengthen your paper. Ms. Sharon Bliss in Room 029 of the Urban Building will provide help if you need it. This paper will be due on Thursday, November 1st. (10 points).

Paper three will use class discussions, assigned readings and "Quiet Crisis" articles in the Plain Dealer. Write a 5-7 page paper describing Cleveland's present situation and the city's future in 2020. Discuss:

- 1. Population & housing trends (who will live here in 2020?)
- 2. Poverty, race & income (where will they work?)
- 3. Industry & the general economy (will the economy be going up?)
- 4. Lakefront development (how will our lakefront look?)

The final paper will be due on the date of the last class lecture Thursday, December 6th (15 points).
